Officer Notification: I am required to make a good faith effort to explain the requirements for a domestic battery arrest and advise you of all reasonable means to prevent further abuse, including advising you of the availability of a shelter or other services in the community.

If I have probable cause to believe that an act of domestic violence has been committed against you, your minor child or the minor child of the person believed to have committed the battery, and I have a face-to-face encounter with the person suspected of committing the act, I am required to arrest the person within 24 hours, unless mitigating circumstances are present. If I do not have a face-to-face encounter with the person suspected of committing the act, I am required to arrest the person within 7 days from the time of the act, unless mitigating circumstances are present. The person arrested will not be released on bail any sooner than 12 hours after his/her arrest.

If I am unable to arrest the person suspected of committing the act of domestic violence against you, the police report will be forwarded to an officer, who will investigate the case and forward it to a prosecutor for review. If the prosecutor approves the case, he/she will request a warrant or summons. The case will then be forwarded to a judge for issuance of the warrant or summons.

Safety Plan

- Contact your local Victim Advocate or domestic violence program.
- Know the safe places that you can go (friends, family, shelters).
- Keep pocket money, important phone numbers, an extra set of house keys and car keys readily available.
- Pack and hide an overnight bag with an extra set of clothes for you and your children.
- Keep a journal of injuries, harassment or anything that just doesn't feel right.
- Maintain a backup of any electronic evidence (texts, photos, emails, recordings, social media).
- Make copies of important papers and hide them.
- Take pictures of injuries.

Obtaining a Protection Order

Apply in person at the Protection Order Help Center at the Washoe County Courthouse, 1 South Sierra Street, Third Floor, Room 308, Reno, Nevada. They are open Monday through Friday 8 am to 5 pm. You may also file online via www.washoecourts.com/domesticviolence.

Emergency Protection Order: If the person who committed the act of **domestic battery** has been **arrested** and is **in jail**, you may apply for an emergency protection order with the courthouse, after business hours by calling (775) 352-5000.

Nevada S.A.V.E.

Custody Notifications for Survivors, Advocates, Victims & Enforcement. Nevada S.A.V.E. is a free, anonymous, computer-based telephone service that provides information on an inmates status and notification when released from the Washoe County Jail. Register at 866-393-5445 or visit save.nv.gov.

Know Your Rights:

Under the Nevada Constitution a victim of crime is defined as anyone who is directly or proximately harmed by a criminal offense. If the victim is under 18, or incapable of asserting his/her rights, certain people can act on the victim's behalf, including the legal guardian, a family member, or another individual appointed by the court. However, the court cannot appoint the defendant to act on the victim's behalf.

In Nevada victims of crime have certain Constitutional rights, which include:

- The right to be treated with fairness and respect and to be free from intimidation, harassment, and abuse throughout the criminal or juvenile justice process.
- The right to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in fixing the amount of bail and release conditions for the defendant.
- The right to prevent the disclosure of confidential information or records to the defendant and to refuse to be interviewed or deposed.
- The right to reasonably confer with the prosecuting agency, to reasonable notice of all public proceedings, and to be heard at any proceeding involving release or sentence, including parole proceedings.
- The right to provide court with information concerning the impact of the offense on the victim and to provide a sentencing recommendation.
- The right to be informed of the conviction, sentence, place and length of incarceration, or other disposition of the defendant's case.
- The right to full and timely restitution.

A victim of a sexual offense may choose a pseudonym to be used instead of the victim's name on all files, records and documents pertaining to the sexual offense.
